Ted-Ed @ CIS

Students today must cultivate the ability to navigate an increasingly connected global society. The ability to do so is the purpose and foundation upon which the Ted Ed Club of CIS was built. A year ago, like thousands of other high school students, I routinely watched TED Talks — but I wanted more from it. At the time, I was determined to start a club in school, however since most of the mainstream clubs already existed, I began doing extensive research on ideas for clubs I could start. Luckily, in January 2014, TED introduced the TED-Ed Club program which I came across during my research. I believed starting this club could give me and my fellow classmates an excellent understanding of what a good TED Talk is while simultaneously enhancing our public speaking skills, so I filled in an application form to be a Ted Ed Club leader.

The application consisted of four rounds, where the first 3 rounds were written applications and the last round was a Skype interview with TED. During the interview, I had the chance to meet other potential facilitators, ask questions and share the ideas I had for starting my TED-Ed Club in CIS. After 45 minutes of intense discussions with the TED team and other leaders, I was granted the right to lead a Ted Ed Club in CIS. The main goal for the club is to help every member find an idea that they are truly passionate about, that is worth spreading, and that they will eventually be able to talk about for at least 2-3 minutes on a public, international platform.

important benefit gained from this club is that students have started to believe that their voice

matters, not just for their teachers to get a grade, or even for their peers for social status, but

for the larger community. In the most recent meeting, the members of the Ted Ed Club of

interest of theirs which has remained a secret, to the whole club. Members opened up about

their passion for painting, doodling, solving puzzles and much more. Not only am I learning
