WondaBoxes introduced in CIS

Curated tiffin tickles students' taste buds

Calcutta: School tiffin is no Calcutta: School tiffin is no longer a snack rustled up by mothers in a morning race against the clock and eaten stone cold later. For children in at least five schools, tiffin is now a curated meal delivered fresh, warm and appetising on the campus every

day. All these schools have chosen a city-based start-up called WondaBox to have food served in lunchboxes to their students at tiffin time. The menu keeps changing, the children seem happy and most mothers are simply re-lieved at not having to worry about what to pack the next morning. WondaBox had started

off around 14 months ago at

Sri Sri Academy and has since expanded to four other campuses — Calcutta Inter-national School, Lakshmipat Singhania Academy, Ma-hadevi Birla World Academy and The Newtown School. A meal typically costs be-tween Rs 55 and 75, depend-ing on the portions and the menu. since expanded to four other

menu. "Many students leave

"Many students leave home for school around 6.30 in the morning and it is not always possible for parents to pack two meals to last the entire day. Many parents event uncarts send processed or ready-made food. This start-up is providing a healthier substitute," said Suvina Shunglu, the principal of Sri Sri Academy. Parents can check and se-lect from the WondaBox

menu on its website and book meals for a year, a month or even a week. Pay-ments are made directly to

ments are made directly to the company. While the menu for a given period is the same for every subscriber, the calorie content of a meal is adjusted depending on the age of the child. WondaBox currently course to 25% chudents and

caters to 350 students and serves a variety of vegetariserves a variety of vegetari-an and non-vegetarian food, including dishes like chicken quesadilla, flavoured herb rice and truffle custard. A meal will either have a dessert or an accompanying drink. "They deliver the food before lunch and our students collect their boxes from the cafeteria," said Munmun Nath, the senior

school principal at Calcutta International. Ashmita Agarwal has taken a yearly subscription for her son, who is in Class VII at Lakshmipat Singhania Academy, and a month's trial for her daughter, a Class IX student at the same school. "The food they serve is not oily or spicy and caters to the taste buds of chil-dren," she said.

dren," she said. Head chef Vishal Dutt, who co-founded WondaBox, tries to design menus that tries to design menus that can potentially increase the craving for food among chil-dren. The attention to detail is visible even in the packag-ing. "Kids are finicky about food and it isn't easy to cre-the competition that coulties ate something that excites them, so we keep improvising," he said.

Spreading Mental Health awareness!




The Psychology students of A2 and IB2 participated in an organised by Fortis Hospital.


