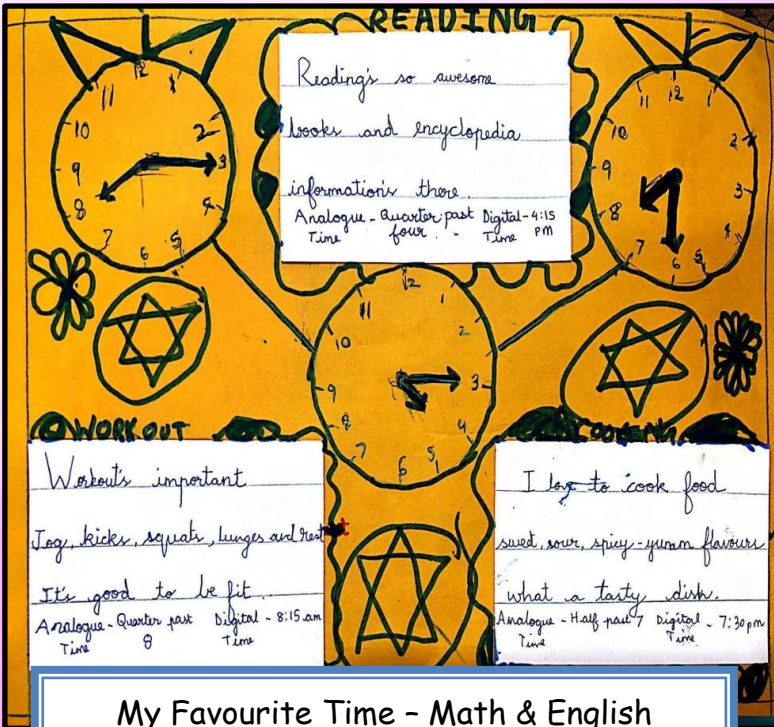

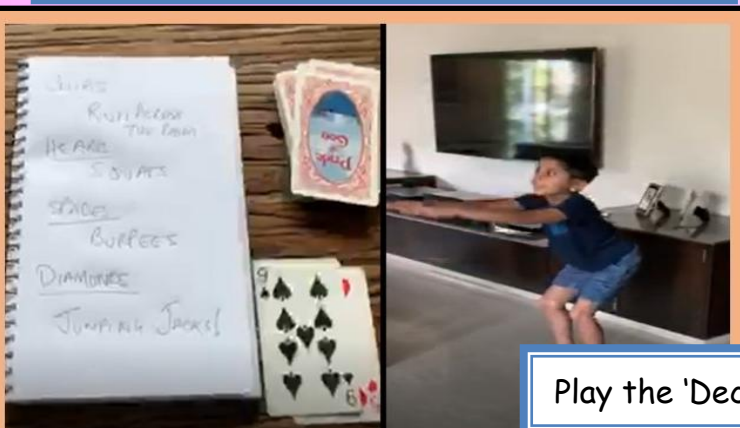

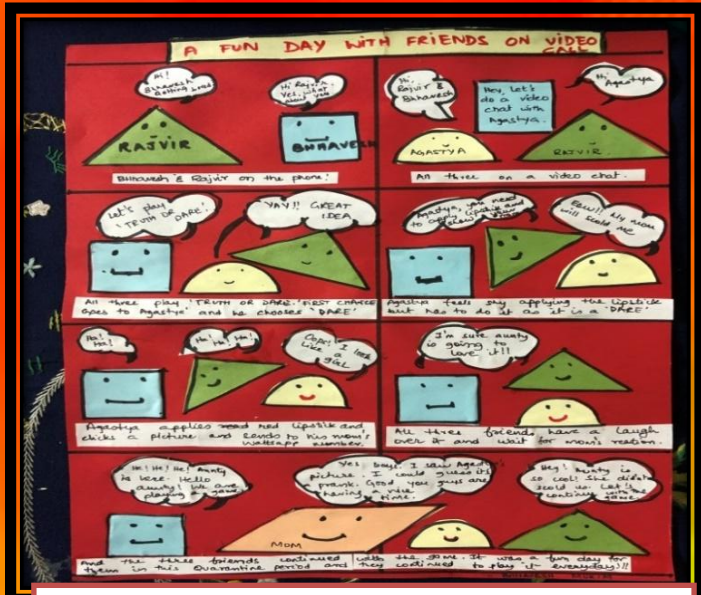

Recipe of a Choco Lava Cake

Ingredients:
 130 g chopped dark chocolate
 1/4 (50 g) cup soft butter
 Half cup all purpose flour sifted
 1-2 tsp cocoa powder sifted
 1/2 tsp baking powder
 1/2 cup milk powder
 Pinch of salt
 1/2 cup of hot water

Method:

- Microwave the chocolate with the butter for 30-60 seconds till the chocolate melts.
- Mix well till smooth.
- Add sifted flour, sifted cocoa powder, powdered sugar, baking powder, milk powder and a pinch of salt.
- Add hot water and mix to form a smooth batter.
- Pour in greased muffin cups or ramekins.
- Bake in a pre heated 180 degree oven for 8-10 minutes.
- Demould and serve warm.

How to battle mental impact of Covid fight

Feeling trapped in Covid 19. During the time of the coronavirus pandemic, the impact of quarantine on mental health of the population cannot be overlooked.

History has evidence that the impact of quarantine is negative on the mental health of individuals.

In order to be able to cope with the impact of quarantine and a possible infection from the virus, we need to make the public more resilient mentally.

A recent study by the medical journal, *The Lancet*, states that the impact of quarantine includes symptoms of post-traumatic stress disorder, feelings of confusion, anger and anxiety.

Following are some practical tips during this difficult time.

At the macro level, governments and organisations can provide mental health services online to the people. A number of mental health professionals are now offering telephonic counselling and online services. Important factual information can be shared by employers, so as to address the stressors of their population of employees.

At the individual level, the following can be done:

- **Follow regular timings:** Make it a point to wake up at a particular time, get bathed, put on fresh clothes and start the day with a purpose.
- **Make a routine:** Plan the day so that certain tasks are done in the morning and the rest in the evening.
- **Schedule "worry time":** It is only natural to "worry" about the current situation and the future at a time like this. It helps to put aside 15 to 20 minutes a day as "worry time".

During this time, write down all your worries and give yourself the time and space to reflect on them.

If your worries come to your mind at another time of the day, push them aside. It may sound silly initially, but eventually one gets conditioned to this.

If your worries are anxiety-provoking, consider talking about them to someone or reach out for professional help.

where, nurses and cops may be the frontlines to battle this deadly virus, but teachers in schools across Kolkata are no less, bravely battling it out in the home front, daily juggling both home and online classes so that their students don't miss out on their classes during the lockdown.

Sumita Acharya from Birta High School puts it very aptly when she says, "Our campus is closed, we are open. This past one month has seen us educators in an altogether new educational landscape posing new challenges that we had never contemplated before. To ensure continuity of learning we have re-

defined our ways to connect with our students. The challenges are many: teaching an 'empty' classroom, bridging connectivity gaps, evaluating efficacy, designing follow-up measures etc. But we are teachers - we facilitate learning. We are also eternal learners. We are learning through trial and error, we swap and we need- iles to reach out to our dear students."

Susmita Ray, the language coordinator of Calcutta International School (junior wing), spent a large part of her day planning to make the teaching and learning process more efficient and productive. Connecting with students through video-conferencing to ensure their emotional wellbeing, keeping them busy with work and later on giving feedback has been a top priority.

Anuradha Banerjee from BDM International points out, "Difficult times have taught us that we are teachers in multi-tasking. We teachers are nothing less than superheroes, taking care-

of household chores and conducting online classes with the same dedication and grit as in actual classrooms. It is no easy task but we are doing it with grace and glory! If Darwin ever had to prove his theory of the survival of the fittest in the present day scenario, we teachers would have proved him correct!"

Anuradha Gosyal of The Heritage School adds, "It was not easy entering Zoom Meeting Rooms and Google Hangouts but we overcame our inhibitions and emerged triumphant. Household chores and kids besides us on one hand led to the feeling of juggling and balancing the two roles is the mark of a teacher!"

Kirti Misra Ghosh a teacher at DPS Ruby Park admits, "30 days say 40 or 48 hour long becomes a classroom. My living room when I used to relax and watch TV has turned into a recording studio where I film myself explaining tasks and demonstrating activities. My kitchen has become an area to produce props for these online classes."

Ranjit Bhownik from The BSS School agrees that the lockdown has changed a teacher's break time into a classroom without a timetable or a break time. "I feel that teachers will admit that the most difficult student is the child at home. The positive thing is that she is making her child more independent."

Shravasti Banerjee from Vivekananda Mission School Joka adds, "Balancing work, planning the next module and managing the home front all at the same time isn't that difficult provided other family members are helping out. We teachers are incredibly multi-taskers and we can mould ourselves very easily in any given situation. The trick is to learn the art of time management."

Sukanya Manjunath from The Heritage School has it all chalked out very well. "I manage everything with scheduled time slots. Early morning is for domestic chores, schoolwork from 9am to 1pm, one-time and family in the evening. No commuting saves time! The schedule keeps me focused, regular and on time. So tired, yes, stressed or bored, No."
