

impromptu dance moves, creating a jubilant and spirited conclusion to the event



















DAAN UTSAB






















Computer Science Club Event Coding and Camaraderie


Diwali Daan

These enlightening realisations inspired them to initiate 'Mera Basta' - a schoolwide social initiative as the intended CAS project." The main goal of 'Mera Basta' is to supply children in need with bags and school supplies to aid them through their journey of pursuing education.





'Mera Basta' intends to execute two more such collection drives, with the aim of conducting the second drive from 4thJanuary, 2024. 






INTERVIEW

ALUMNI CORNER



Aakash Majumdar, our distinguished alumnus who juggles careers in Marketing and Music speaks to us about what inspires him.

1. Can you share a memorable experience from your time at our school that had a significant impact on your personal or professional development?

I remember my experience as Red House Captain preparing for the Annual Swim and Sports meet. Maharshee Karia, my vice captain, and I spent hours poring over our house's heat times and best possible combinations for relay races, and for the first time in 8 years, won both events by handsome margins. We were also incredibly blessed to have many talented athletes in our house - that in combination with detailed preparation and concentration helped us achieve our goals. Translating that to life today, I still maintain a high level of attention to detail in my both my professional and personal pursuits, and together with a little luck, it has helped me along the road.

2. How did your education at our school prepare you for your current career?

My time at CIS was equally spent in class and in extra curricular activities. Having to balance my time from early on has helped me immensely in managing two parallel careers. During the day, I work as a Marketing Manager at a global energy firm, and I also have a music career based in Nashville. It's tough to balance sometimes without compromising either pursuit, but my experience from my CIS days still proves useful.

3. What advice do you have for current students who are preparing to enter the workforce or pursue higher education?

Focus on community. The educational and vocational aspects will be integral to your pursuit, but the people around you are equally, if not moreso, important. The meaningful connections you make with your peers, mentors, coworkers, and bosses not only foster a good professional environment, but can pay dividends along the road. My career in energy came about through some wonderful friends and mentors I made at my time in business school at Rice University. Build and use your network - and make sure you pay it forward!

4. Can you discuss a challenging situation you faced after graduation and how your education here helped you navigate it?

During my time at CIS, a lot of my teachers emphasized out of the box thinking - especially our statistics teacher at the time, Mr. Sabyasachi Mitra. In a largely standardized environment, it was always nice to be encouraged to pursue unconventional wisdom. This framework of thinking really helped during college and business school, as many problems often required a non-traditional approach. While a lot of my peers had to adjust their approaches during these situations, I felt like I was a few steps ahead because of my experience at CIS.

5. In what ways have you stayed connected with the school since graduating, and why do you feel it's important to maintain that connection?

I am still in touch with many friends and some teachers. They are all an important part of my journey and who I am, and continue to hold that role in my life. No matter where I've moved across the United States, or visited Kolkata, there's always a piece of home, and people I can turn to for counsel, or simply a good time.

6. How has the industry or field you're in evolved since you graduated, and how have you adapted to these changes?

Unsurprisingly, the progress of AI has accelerated at breakneck speed. It has affected both my careers in energy and music. It's important to stay abreast of developments while staying conscientious of the use of AI. LLMs like ChatGPT and Google Bard can make daily tasks and content generation easier, but a human touch remains irreplaceable. I try my best to stay aware of the conversation around AI and the ethics of its use.

7. Are there specific extracurricular activities or initiatives at our school that you believe contributed significantly to your overall growth?

I really enjoyed the graphic design program I was part of for a few years, as it helped further my visualization skills, which I use on a daily basis in my energy and music careers. In energy, it helps me engage clients by empowering me to organize and deliver key information in the best possible way, and for music, it allows me to develop and stay consistent with my branding.



The IBDP Year I students contributed vital resources, such as seed packets and a jar of organic compost from a batch. to facilitate $_{\mathrm{IB}}$ experimental endeavor. The students have taken the necessary steps to create a suitable environment for their project and have initiated close monitoring of their plant's growth. To systematically gather data, they've established a data collection table and developed a PowerPoint presentation to consistently record their ongoing observations.

In a parallel effort to promote environmental awareness and sustainable practices, Grade 7 students, named themselves as the "Green Guardians" and took forward this endeavour and focused on sowing saplings for organic farming on their school campus. This collaborative initiative not only enriched their understanding of organic agriculture but also solidified their commitment to a greener and healthier future. The Green Guardians have gone the extra mile by creating placards and posters about organic farming to raise awareness among their peers. They've also sown various vegetable seeds at their homes and are diligently tracking their growth.







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







GRADE 12 PHYSICS

After returning to their table they had another five minutes to reflect on what was done and what other points could be added further.



















Chemistry: Elementary Explorations: Crafting a Unique Periodic Table





Exemplary creative ideas born out of the minds of these young chemists was evident in the amazing topics chosen for developing their individual periodic tables. Colourful and informative, the periodic table developed by the students was displayed on the hallway bulletin boards.

Students selected a theme that contained at least twenty 'things' that could be arranged into a periodic pattern in different ways after which they then created a Periodic Table of the items. For example, a student created a Periodic Table of musical instruments for which he represented each family member as a different type of instrument (woodwinds, horns, strings, percussion) and the periodicity was maintained by the instruments' range with the largest range at the top of the family and the narrowest range at the bottom of the family.


The students have created Periodic Tables for various themes ranging from Marvel and Harry Potter characters to types of cereal, sneakers, basketball and cricket players.


The planning, execution and presentation of the key word project was done entirely by the students. The work was displayed in the classroom which looks like a mini-gallery, with its vibrant and

















THE LANGUAGE OF EMOJIS
















:: A Celebration of Bengali Literature ::
