Symposium 2.0

The CIS Symposium 2.0, took place on 1st February 2025.It welcomed over 60 educators from across the city for a morning of insightful discussions and collaborative learning. Total attendance of invited participants and in house attendees was over 100.

This year, the Symposium focused on sharing best practices in teaching and learning, fostering a platform for educators to exchange innovative strategies that can be implemented across diverse curricula. CIS curated sessions that cater to the evolving needs of education in the 21st century, with a special emphasis on inclusivity and effective pedagogical measures.





Symposium 2.0 continued...

The symposium began with a panel discussion on *Teaching in the 21st Century – Expectations and the Way Forward*, featuring experts like Ms. Mitakshara Kumari, Ms. Richa Debgupta, Ms. Aruna Bhaskar, and Mrs. Tina Servaia, moderated by Mrs. Preeti Roychoudhury.

This was followed by breakout sessions led by CIS teachers on topics such as scaffolding, differentiation strategies, formative assessments, and innovative approaches to supporting diverse learners. Over 100 educators from various institutions participated, making the symposium a valuable platform for collaboration and professional growth.

IAYP SEMINAR

On 13th July, Saturday we had a IAYP seminar organised by the National Office at the Kenilworth Hotel. The programme officer, Mr. Mukhoti informed us about the updates regarding the adventure journey, Online record book and demonstrated the process of how to fill up the record book. In this event the National Office also handed over the bronze, silver certificates to a group of students who were visually impaired.





Middle MUN 2025: A Journey in Diplomacy and Journalism





The two-day *Middle School Model United Nations (MiddleMUN) 2025* conference brought together young minds to debate global issues while fostering diplomacy and critical thinking. The three committees—SPECPOL, UNSC, and IPC—provided a dynamic platform for discussion.

In SPECPOL, delegates addressed terrorism in Africa, focusing on insurgencies in the Sahel, Boko Haram, and foreign involvement, proposing solutions like regional coalitions and international aid. The UNSC discussed the Indo-Pakistani War of 1971, frozen on December 6, 1971, tackling refugee crises and ceasefire proposals. IPC journalists provided real-time coverage, ensuring balanced reporting.

The conference concluded with intense resolution drafting and a closing ceremony recognizing outstanding delegates and journalists. *MiddleMUN 2025* empowered students with valuable skills in diplomacy, negotiation, and media, preparing them to be future leaders and communicators.

The interactive and engaging sessions enabled students to discuss certain stereotypes attached to mental health which often work as a deterrent to seeking support

Through interactive conversations and real-life examples, students learned about the importance of mental well-being and how counseling can be a safe and supportive space for anyone facing challenges—big or small. The session encouraged open-mindedness, self-care, and supporting peers who may need someone to talk to.

Students were provided an insight about how confidentiality works in counselling. Help Seeking Behaviour was normalized and reinforced - students were encouraged to reach out to school counsellors to manage their difficulties and emotions confidently







Grade 9 batch trip to Bikaner


AS batch trip to Ranthambore








Walking Through History: Kolkata's WWII Legacy



The occasion was celebrated on March 7, 2025, in the AVR. A few photos of the event are attached.



Paper to Purpose: Reusing for a Greener Tomorrow







On February 12th and 14th, during zero lessons, grade 9 took part in an exclusive workshop initiated by the senior school social service team, on reusing and repurposing newspapers. This workshop was conducted by our sub-staff members, Lokkhi Majumdar and Tama Sarkar, who provided the learners with hands-on skill training to the grade 9 learners. The students were taught the skills of turning the newspapers into sturdy envelopes that would be used for exam purposes. This initiative curtailed the need for purchasing envelopes and instead use this sustainable practice of reusing the newspapers which otherwise goes to waste. The aims of this workshop were not just fostering environmental awareness among the young learners or encourage skill-based learning but most importantly, empowering our sub-staff members to be part of the social and cultural fabric of CIS. A small token of appreciation was also provided to these sub-staff champions by our IGCSE Section Head, Mrs. Manideepa Raychaudhuri.

Hygiene Kit distribution

In December 2024, AS Level Travel and Tourism students hosted *Winter Jamboree* as part of their coursework, using surplus funds to provide hygiene kits and snacks to underprivileged girls at Future Hope School. In collaboration with Akhil Bhartiya Marwari Mahila Sammelan, they conducted the distribution on February 24, 2025.

During the session, students raised awareness about cervical cancer, highlighting its dangers and the importance of menstrual hygiene. The girls' lack of knowledge on the topic underscored the need for education. With 600,000 annual cases and 350,000 deaths, cervical cancer disproportionately affects rural women due to poor hygiene and limited healthcare access. The students emphasized the role of clean menstrual products in preventing infections like HPV, the leading cause of cervical cancer, and informed them about available vaccines.





Winter-wear Drive

Navya Kothari of grade 9 conducted a winter-wear drive in the school, whereby different members of the community anonymously donated gently used winter clothing in a cardboard box. These winter clothes were then sorted in terms of different age levels and distributed to the Tiljala Shed NGO on 26th December, 2024. She was accompanied by her Co-CT, Ms. Ayesha Begum and her mother, Mrs. Kothari for distribution of the clothes. The generosity coupled with the winter clothes and packets of refreshments added warmth and smile in the faces of the children in the slum region.


collaboration between recent Mathematics and Science departments aimed to equip IBDP students with key their statistical internal tools for assessments, which contribute 20% to their IB Mrs. Paromita overall score. Bhattacharjee, Head of Science and ICT, opened the session with an overview of Group 4 Internal Assessment rubrics. Dr. Lodh from the Mathematics Tamalika the department then demonstrated application of statistical tools using example datasets. Students learned to represent data in tables, create scatter plots, apply best-fit lines, and perform regression analysis in Excel. The session highlighted real-world scientific of statistics applications in research, strengthening analytical skills and supporting extended essay and IA writing.

IS THE FITTED LINE THE BEST FIT LINE?


The exact relationship between X and Y is not linear, we are only approximating the relationship by a line.

Thus the model can be written as

$$Y = a + bX + error$$

This error in the equation is the difference between the observed value and the predicted value of Y.

Thus, we wish to have such values of a and b for which these residuals are minimum.





INNOVATIVE TEACHING - Think Pair Share

<u>IB1 History students</u> started off their study of 'The Cold War: Superpower tensions and rivalries' by looking into the perceived differences between the American and Russian blocs during the Cold War era. The teaching-learning strategy of <u>Think-Pair-Share</u> was used with the teacher guiding the students at each step. The activity had the following steps:

THINK: For this, students looked into resources on capitalism, communism, political orders, economical structures in order to understand how much of this rivalry stemmed from ideological reasons and what other factors could have contributed to this rift.

PAIR: Students worked in pairs to research the given topic and come up with their observations.

SHARE: Students then shared their findings with the rest of the class. This was followed by a lively discussion on the various aspects of the conflict.

Learning Objective: The activity and the subsequent reflections helps students in learning from one another and also gives them the Learner Agency to voice their opinion, talk about multiple perspectives - which are vital for the subject.








INNOVATIVE TEACHING - Experiential Learning Experience

An experiential learning activity in IB Mathematics AISL aimed to deepen students' understanding of optimisation by connecting theory with real-world problem solving. Led by Dr. Tamalika Lodh, students explored how to maximise the volume of a box by cutting squares from its corners. They applied differential calculus to find turning points and used tools like Desmos and graphing calculators for both algebraic and graphical analysis. Working in groups, students collaborated, tackled challenges, and developed critical thinking skills. A final reflection linked optimisation to real-life applications in business and engineering, boosting students' confidence and demonstrating the value of hands-on mathematical learning.








Waves of Innovation: Exploring Electromagnetic Waves Through Student Creativity

The Grade 9 physics students participated in an exciting poster competition on the theme "Role of Electromagnetic Waves in Our Life." The posters covered various topics, such as the role of EM waves in medicine, space exploration, their effects on the environment, and the future of wireless technology. Students did individual research at home, gathered information and worked together in groups during the first lesson to make the posters within a stipulated time. Once done, they presented and explained their poster content to the judges and classmates. 
